- Students from IARU partner universities receive a 50% tuition subsidy for SE2222 and SE2880A or SE2211.
- NUS students who read 2 modules related to Southeast Asia (marked with *) receive a 50% tuition fee subsidy.

Classes, Credits and Assessments

Field trip courses will offer 2 weeks of 3-hour classes twice a week and 2 weeks of 3-hour classes thrice a week. Courses with a field trip component will be travelling within the period of 5th to 13th July 2014, although some trips may be longer.

Non-field trip courses will offer 4 weeks of 3-hour classes thrice weekly. There are no formal classes during the field trip week but there may be additional assignments or e-learning options for students.

The full time-table is available for viewing on the FASstrack Asia website.

Courses are graded based on assessments and class participation, and there are no final exams. We expect each course to have a class

enrollment of not more than 30 students with the exception of capstone modules.

Each course carries 4 Modular Credits awarded by NUS; which is the equivalent of a 3-credit hour course under the North American credit system or 6 ECTS under the European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System. Formal contact hours per course are a minimum of 30 hours. For courses with field trip, this exclude the contact hours for the field trip component and which can be as much as 4 to 5 hours per day for a 10 day trip. Courses with no field trip component will offer 36 contact hours with additional assignments during field trip week.

A. NUS Students

NUS students reading modules related to Southeast Asia in Context (IARU GSP) or OdySEA enjoy a 50% tuition subsidy for 2 modules read. Please note that field trip costs will also apply if you are reading a course with an overseas field trip component. Scholarship/bursary awards are also available for needy students.

While we encourage NUS students to stay on-campus as part of the summer school experience, this is not a compulsory option for you. If you wish to stay, the on-campus accommodation fees listed on the next page will apply and financial aid is available. The details will be set out in the call for application email sent by the Study Abroad @ FASS team.

Please also note that you will be subjected to these costs as well:

1. Study materials
2. Additional meals in the country(ies) where the field trip is conducted if you are reading a field trip course
3. Participation in social events such as the Singapore Heritage tour and farewell dinner
4. Transport and entrance fees (if any) of any local field trips that lecturers may organise on the weekends for the students

B. International Students

(i) Exchange

For international students who are nominated by their home university under an exchange arrangement with NUS, the tuition fee of \$2,590 per course will be waived. All other costs will still apply.

(ii) Non-Exchange

If you are coming under a non-exchange arrangement, then the tuition fees of \$2,590 per course will apply, together with all other costs.

For International Alliance of Research Universities (IARU) international students, who wish to join the NUS IARU Global Summer Programme under the Southeast Asia in Context part of the summer school, please refer to www.iaruni.org/gsp for application details. Students from IARU partner universities enjoy a 50% tuition grant for the 2014 session.
